## PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE...

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

Ready for a little poetry? You will probably be able to guess the age of the poet:

#### "A dad is a person who is loving and kind, And often he knows what you have on your mind. He's someone who listens, suggests and defends. A dad can be one of your very best friends."

Children who can write poems like this are saying that they feel that they really matter and are important in the lives of their fathers. A father can do a lot for a child but it is the emotional bond that the child feels, that their dad is really there for them and that their welfare and progress socially, intellectually and emotionally really matter to their dad.

As men have become more concerned about balancing work and family, they have recognised the enormous benefits, rewards and satisfaction from being a good parent. They see that the emotional investment they make in their children comes back to them in terms of making them more open and more satisfied as an adult human being.

Being a dad, however, entails knowing when to shift gear and move into a role that is appropriate to the development of our child. Mark Twain's witty observation has some advice to offer: "When I was a boy of 14, my father was so ignorant I could hardly stand to have him around. When I got to 21, I was astonished at how much he had learned in seven years."

One thing that we dad's have to do is to make a conscious change in the way we handle our children when they reach adolescence. In our child's young life we are, traditionally, the provider and the rule maker. When our child becomes a young teenager, we need to make a shift towards being an adviser, confidant and guidance counsellor. Instead of imposing rules, we can listen and allow our child to take some of the responsibility for making decisions and gradually take on a more adult role, while we provide the emotional security, nurturing and warmth that our child needs. If we fail to make the shift, we run the risk of giving our child the Mark Twain experience – a dad "gone missing" for seven years.

There is much truth in the observation that "A man's garden and his children, both reflect the amount of nurturing done during the growing season". Author unknown. So, how about some more of that poem:

"Thank you, dad,for listening and caring for giving and sharing. but, especially, for just being you. Happy Father's Day!"



#### **LEAVING STUDENTS**

A terms notice (10 school weeks) in writing must be given to the Principal before the removal of a student or a full term's fees will be payable. The notice can be given any time during term for the next term. Where appropriate notice has been received a pro-rata credit can be calculated based on a pro-rata 40 week year. One exception is that notice in writing will be accepted at any time during Term 4 in relation to the following years' enrolment ie: the notice period of 10 school weeks will be waived in this circumstance.

#### SCHOOL TIMES / SUPERVISION / IF YOUR CHILD IS AWAY


Please remember that playground supervision at school commences at 8.20am. For safety reasons, children should not be at school before 8.20am. School starts at 8.50am. Children need to be at school with enough time so they can have a play and socialise with their friends and go to the toilet before lessons start.

If your child/ren are away from school, please send an explanation note with your child when they return to school, alternatively absent notes can be sent in via the skoolbag app. If no explanation is received then your child is marked as an unexplained absence. If your child/ren arrive late for school, you need to bring them into the office and sign them in. If you need to collect your child early from school, you must send a note to the Principal (via the class teacher), explaining why they need to leave early and asking for permission.




# The relationship between **BOOKS AT HOME** nd student achievem


Students at or above the proficient standard for Australia:






Year 4 Science

The Measurement Framework for Schooling In Australia 2015 set the proficient standard for TIMSS mathematics and science as the intermediate international benchmark. Proficient standards represent a "challenging but reasonable" expectation of student achievement.
